### TAILGATE SAFETY MEETINGS

## What, Why, Where and How.

#### **OSHA REQUIREMENT**

If you work in the construction trade, Tailgate Safety Meetings are required by Cal/OSHA.

#### WHAT IS A TAILGATE SAFETY MEETING

Tailgate Safety Meetings are **on-the-job meetings that target the hazards and safe work practices** for the job and tasks that your employees are actually performing.

#### **PURPOSE**

- Improve the safety culture in your business.
- Help your employees recognize and eliminate jobsite hazards.
- Train employees in safe work practices.

#### **HOW OFTEN SHOULD YOU HAVE A TAILGATE SAFETY MEETING**

California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 1509(e) states: Supervisory employees shall conduct "tailgate" safety meetings, or equivalent, with their crews **at least every 10 working days** to emphasize safety.

#### **PDCC IS YOUR SOURCE FOR TAILGATES**

#### WHAT SHOULD THE TAILGATES BE ABOUT

Tailgate safety meetings must address a topic that is relevant to the job or tasks that your workers perform. Talk about work practices, tools, equipment, materials, attitudes and anything else that may cause or contribute to a work-related accident or illness.

Look for potential safety hazards on your jobsite. If an accident or near-accident occurred at your jobsite, talk about the incident, including why it happened and how it can be prevented from happening again.

**Encourage your employees to suggest Tailgate safety topics.** 

Encourage your employees to point our potential hazards and to share their personal safety experiences.

#### **HOW LONG SHOULD THE TAILGATE MEETING BE**

The **Tailgate Safety Meeting can be as brief as 10 or 15 minutes**. Hold the meeting at the jobsite, preferably at the start of a shift or after a break.

#### SHOULD THE TAILGATE BE CONDUCTED IN PERSON

Yes.

#### **TAILGATE TOPICS FOR PAINTING CONTRACTORS**

OSHA has a list of <u>Construction Safety Topics</u> and articles. Generally, the following are some of the safety topics relevant to painters.

- Fall Protection, Ladders, Stairs, Scaffolding
- Lead, Mold, Asbestos
- Respiratory Protection, Eye & Face Protection
- · Airless Sprayers, Hand and Power Tools
- First Aid, Heat Illness Prevention, Lifting Heavy Objects
- Driving Safely
